CPC GUARANTEES HONG KONG'S AUTONOMY

China's ruling Communist Party today vowed autono my for Hong Kong where pro democracy protesters have locked horns with the city administration for over a month on the election of next Chief Executive and stop interfering in the judicial process to make it more independent.

The plenum of the Communist Party of China (CPC) comprising of 363 members promised to "guarantee the practise of 'one country, two systems" in Hong Kong, state-run Xinhua news agency quoted a statement issued at the end of the four day meeting chaired by CPC General Secretary Xi Jin-

This is the fist time that plenum, the highest policy body of the party was held after Xi took over power last year emerging as the most powerful Chinese leader in recent times head-ing the Party, Presidency and the Army.

New Japan minister hit by S&M bar scandal

Japan was stung today by its third political scandal in a week after the country's new industry ministerwhose predecessor resigned in disgrace over misspending admitted that his underlings had spent office cash

at a sex bar.
The new revelations could deal another serious blow to Prime Minister Shinzo Abe, whose administration is already facing a public backlash over its bid to turn Japan's shuttered nuclear reactors back on while his plan to revive the economy

Today, newly appointed industry minister Yoichi Miyazawa, a Harvard grad-uate and former senior bureaucrat in the finance ministry, distanced himself from the affair, saying he wasn't present at the sex club

"I came to know of that through a media report, and it was true," Miyazawa told reporters in Tokyo.

It was not immediately clear if Miyazawa - a nephew of late prime minister Kiichi Miyazawa and a cousin of Foreign Minister Fumio Kishida - would step down. "(Miyazawa) will handle

On Tuesday, Miyazawa was tapped to replace indus-try minister Yuko Obuchi, who stepped down over claims she misspent politi-cal funds, while Justice Min-ister Midori Matsushima also quit after days of allegations that she had misspent money in what opponents insisted was an attempt to buy votes

Bloody day in Pak's Quetta leaves 14 dead

A bloody day in Quetta today left at least 14 people dead and about 50 others injured in a series of attacks, including a suicide bombing targeting Pakistan's top reli-gious leader Maulana Fazlur Rehman who survived the bid on his life.

Rehman was attacked by a suicide bomber outside a rally venue in Quetta, the capital of the restive Balochistan province, as at least two people were killed and 30 others injured. The blast occurred when the Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam

Fazl (JUI-F) chief was leaving after addressing the massive rally where over 20,000 of his supporters had gathered, officials said.
"I was the target of the

attack but God saved me. My vehicle was bullet and bomb proof so I survived but the vehicle has been destroyed," Rehman said.

Terming the attack as a suicide bombing, Rehman said, "I don't know who wants to kill me. I am a reli-gious man and chief of a religious party which wants

No group has claimed responsibility for the attack but Baloch nationalists often target security forces in the province.

Before this assault. unidentified gunmen today killed at least nine Shia Muslims, members of the ethnic Hazara community, here. The victims were travelling in a bus when gunmen attacked them in Hazar Ganji area of Quetta.

TANZANIA TO **VOTE ON NEW**

Dar Es Salaam, 23 October: Tanzania will hold a referendum in April 2015 on a new constitution, the government has announced, a move rejected by the oppo-sition, who said today that the constitution drafting

process ignored it.

The opposition is angry because the draft constitution makes few major changes to the structure of government, claiming it has therefore rejected its calls for a strengthening of the federal system to limit presidential powers.

"I can confirm April 30 as the date for referendum," Attorney General Frederick Werema said.

Opposition lawmakers led by the Chadema party stormed out during debate on the draft, leaving dis-cussion to the ruling Chama Cha Mapinduzi (CCM) party, which has been in power since independence in 1961, and controls two-thirds of the assembly.

"There was no quorum during the drafting process, and we have reports of cheat ing," Chadema spoke John Mnyika said.
